HISTORY HEREABOUTS

On the Local History Trail

I had thought that my local history boots had been well and truly hung up. I was quietly pondering the great conundrums of the day, wondering where those great balls of fluff, rolling like tumbleweed across a Wild West movie set, had come from, the day after the vacuum cleaner had been searching them out in every nook and cranny. Or why does Robson Green's accent change according to whoever he is talking to. You know, the burning questions of the age. But, I digress.

For those of you who are most alert, you may have seen interpretation boards mysteriously appearing in Eglingham, North Charlton and South Charlton. These are



the result of a project, sponsored by the Parish Council, financially supported by a grant from RWE Wind Farm Fund and designed by Ben Smith of MGH Consultants.

These interpretation boards tell the story of past times in the village communities, and they have been developed by a number of parishioners: Carolyn Brewster in Eglingham; Alyson McGarrigle in North Charlton; Lorna Turner, Belinda Dance and Andy Gray in South Charlton.

The team has been kept in some semblance of order by the project co-ordinator, and Parish Councillor, Jane Hamilton. Yours truly has provided local history expertise, as required. In addition, the memories of long-time residents of the villages have been tapped into.

The idea for local history panels is not new, but for a variety of reasons it was never pursued. It was revived by Alyson McGarrigle in 2021 who suggested a history panel for North Charlton. Jane Hamilton then had the vision for a parish wide project and presented the concept to the Council.

The spark which really ignited this project came from a separate piece of work being carried out by Carolyn Brewster and Margaret Bell on behalf of the Church of St Maurice in Eglingham. This project will be called the Lindisfarne Legacy and will be presented as a permanent exhibition within the Ogle Chapel. An official launch is planned for May.

So where can you find these interpretation boards:

In Eglingham, there are three:

One stands on the grass verge near the Coach House by the church, the Coach House wall having proved unsuitable as a destination. This gives a pictorial overview of the village with various buildings of interest noted. In addition, several historical events are highlighted;

One graces the wall of the village hall and describes the story of this historic site; One stands within the churchyard and gives a brief history of the church together with the churchyard and highlights some of the fascinating headstones to be seen there.

In North Charlton there is one:

This is wall mounted next to the village notice board. It reveals the rich history of a once thriving community not so readily visible today.

In South Charlton there are two, both of which are sited in the village garden:

One shows the village in the 18th Century, with a very different layout to that seen today;

The second shows the "planned" village built in the mid-19th Century. It is worth taking the time, when in South

Charlton, to also visit St James Church. An interpretation board graces the porch there.

Please take the time to browse these boards and feel the echoes of past lives who have lived, loved, suffered and died in our own village communities. Once, these villagers looked out onto the same landscape as we do now, and lived their own lives in their own times, worrying, laughing, crying. Eventually we too will form part of that community history.

Remember the young boy who had his childhood dreams in North Charlton and who would travel across the world and become the head of government in Victoria, Australia; think of those watching as the coaches travelling between London and Edinburgh on the Great North Road, came and went to the coaching inn; think of the parents puzzling over the futures of their children taught in the newly established schools. Imagine the fear when the warnings went out that raiders and armies were marching towards the villages. Think about the activity and hard work of villagers, tradespeople and monks.

A past worth getting to know.

Northumberland County Council's Library Services

Mobile Library Services are available to any library member in our parish area. They bring the wealth of public library information direct to your armchair without even having to leave your home. In a rural area such as ours where transport can be difficult and expensive, it's a service which more of us could and should use more. If you would like to save money on e-books, e-audiobooks, newspapers and magazine subscriptions, then read on!

Mobile Library is of value to those whose mobility is restricted through ill health, lack of transport or those who simply just want to use their cars less. Customers can choose books in person on the mobile library van at its various stops. They can request other titles by speaking to the library van driver. This service covers rural locations which do not have a library, but where residents are still able to physically attend the library van. There is a stop criterion of 3-5 customers for additional stops to be considered. Currently, van stops include Eglingham and Harehope Gardens. Books can be ordered in advance via the website and customers should select North Mobile Library as the pickup location in order to collect from the van.

Home Library delivers items free to your door if you are unable to visit the library yourself and have no-one to visit on your behalf. There is no charge for borrowing any items. You can choose how many items you borrow - up to 20 at a time. A volunteer will bring the items to your home every 4 weeks, at a time that suits you. The home library

service is operated by staff within the libraries and some volunteers. It is limited by the availability of staff/volunteers and somewhat dependent on the location of the requests, but NCC will always try and deliver this service to you.

SCORES OF NEW BUSES AND EV CHARGERS COMING TO REGION

The council has welcomed news that a scores of new electric buses are coming to the region.

The vehicles are on the way alongside nearly 100 more charging points after the North East successfully secured £19.5m of investment through the Levelling Up Fund for a Transport Decarbonisation package.

The multi-million-pound investment will greatly enhance zero carbon options for local people, delivering up to 52 new high-quality electric buses which will travel on some of the region's most heavily congested routes, alongside 92 new Electric Vehicle (EV) chargers – many at key destinations such as Park and Ride sites – to encourage multimodal journeys.

It is hoped expanded EV charging infrastructure will encourage more people to consider switching to a zero-emission vehicle where possible.

Cllr Martin Gannon, Chair, North East Joint Transport Committee, said: "I'm delighted to welcome this £19.5m investment which will enable us to deliver our Transport Decarbonisation package of new electric buses and electric vehicle charge-points.

"This funding will greatly boost the availability of zero carbon transport options for local people – enabling cleaner, greener journeys to work and education, improving air quality, and reducing our carbon emissions from transport.

Stagecoach North East Managing Director, Steve Walker, said: "On behalf of North East Bus Operators Association, my colleagues and I are delighted with the announcement of this £19.5m investment in our region's transport network.

"This major funding builds on existing investment in greener buses across the North East, as we continue to work towards Net Zero bus fleets by 2035 and continue to demonstrate our collaborative approach and absolute commitment to ensuring the future prosperity of local communities.

"Buses are the solution to the UK's biggest challenges: major congestion and declining air quality, and securing this investment makes a significant contribution to enhancing our region's public transport offer with the introduction of greener, modern and accessible buses, which connect our people and provide critical links to employment, education, health and leisure facilities."

NEW ELECTIONS VOTER ID REQUIREMENT

From 4 May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections.

This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections.

If you don't have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

BRINGING ID AND

ACCEPTED FORMS OF PHOTO ID

You can use any of the following accepted forms of photo ID when voting at a polling station.

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL

 Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country

DRIVING AND PARKING

- Driving licence issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (this includes a provisional driving licence)
- A Blue Badge

LOCAL TRAVEL

- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Oyster 60+ Card
- Freedom Pass
- Scottish National Entitlement Card
- 60 and Over Welsh Concessionary Travel Card
- Disabled Person's Welsh Concessionary Travel Card
- Senior SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Registered Blind SmartPass or Blind Person's SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- War Disablement SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- 60+ SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Half Fare SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland

PROOF OF AGE

Identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)

OTHER GOVERNMENT ISSUED DOCUMENTS

- Biometric immigration document
- Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- National identity card issued by an EEA state
- Electoral Identity Card issued in Northern Ireland
- Voter Authority Certificate
- Anonymous Elector's Document

You will only need to show one form of photo ID. It needs to be the original version

and not a photocopy.
OUT OF DATE PHOTO ID

You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

24th Nov Meeting of Eglingham Parish Council

Held at SCVH

Full minutes and minutes from following meetings are available via the parish website www.eglingham.info

Present: Lorna Turner (LT), Joanne Angus (JA), Jane Hamilton (JH), Jamie Logan (JLo), June Lawson (JLaw), Clair Leishman (CL), Paul Davies (PD), Judith Scott (JS), Alison McGarrigle (AM)

Matters arising: to receive updates on matters not appearing elsewhere on the agenda;

North Charlton defibrillator - JH confirmed submission of application to the RWE wind farm fund.

Second speed camera in Eglingham - JLo confirmed submission of application to the RWE wind farm fund.

Biodiversity report - Discussion was held regarding phase 3 of the biodiversity report. Due to PC concerns regarding the publication of survey results on the website, written permission will be re-sought from participating landlords, prior to any segmented publication in the future. JH to arrange.

Bus Stop Bin Relocation - The bin was removed. JA to approach landowner about installing a new bin on

their wall.

Condition of Verge At the bottom of the Terrace/Fernylea, Eglingham - there was confusion about the precise location and nature of the issue reported but was believed as being an issue that has been going on for some time. Clerk to contact Bob Hodgson of NCC to arrange a meeting with JS at a mutually agreeable time in the future to point out the issue for resolution with NCC.

Overhanging tree branches Eglingham - Noted that JA has contacted the Property Owner regarding this

Parish clerk - Andy Gray agreed to be Clerk for a trial period of three meetings. It was agreed that the parish council would authorise payment at the end of each month on the production of an invoice.

Footpaths, Styles, & Fingerposts Project - following on from the previous meeting and the agreement to support this project subject to further information being gained, LT had met ECA representatives, who will lead the project, for further information. She had also contacted the Paths/rights of way department of Northumberland County Council for clarification on responsibilities.

The Parish Council resolved to support this project following a unanimous vote.

Parish Council budget and Precept 2023 to 2024 - the precept application needs to be submitted before the 27th of January, after the next meeting. A brief discussion outlining the situation of finances followed, it was decided to make the final decision at the next meeting once more information was available. It was noted by the clerk that the finance spreadsheets are out of date and have not been updated since September, this needs to be done to fully understand the situation of the PC finances and therefore the required monies for 23/24.

Eglingham Parish Neighbourhood Plan (EGPNP) - Councillors had sat in on a presentation and Q&A with Sarah Brannigan of NCC to understand the EGPNP's multiple year history, its current version and next steps to complete it.

It was stated that if EGPNP was restarted from its current standpoint, the timescale for completion would be no earlier than Summer 2023.

LT had spoken to Jenny Ludman who had been working on refining the document to outline what was needed.

A discussion was held. Th PC resolved to continue with the 10th draft EGPNP in its current form.

JA to join the EGPNP steering group, existing members to continue in their positions.

It was proposed, and agreed that the former PC Chair and Lead of the EGPNP project, David Biesterfield, be asked to continue the project and take it to its conclusion. JH raised an issue with photographs taken from private land and used in the Design Code. JH & LT to write to affected owners regarding matter.

Agenda Items:

Suggestion Box Submissions:

An anonymous request for a **new Noticeboard for South Charlton** was noted. Clerk to do initial research into styles/pricing to be discussed at a future meeting.

Waste Bins for Hagdon - JS volunteered to take these back to Hagdon as there are no longer any residents following its sale.

Playground on Parish Field, Eglingham:

JLo reported back following initial research. He had acquired an example quote of £10,000 for a 3 item "playground" seated on an 9x10m area with full "safety flooring". There would be insurance and maintenance costs above this.

CL declared an interest as a direct neighbour.

A robust discussion was had. Point was made that the PC requires researched rationale regarding plans and projects. Decided to look into it further, speak to neighbours and community organisations to produce options for future discussions.

Community Allotment, South Charlton:

The Agreement from Northumberland Estates had been assessed and it is a simple agreement. N.E. requires it to be signed by a single person or entity. LT has produced a further agreement to be signed by the gardeners agreeing to carry out all requirements of the NE Agreement. The PC will have no practical responsibility regarding the management of the allotment.

It was agreed unanimously that LT would sign on behalf of the PC.
