## Eglingham WI

At our April meeting in South Charlton, we had 5 visitors who had come to hear a talk on the Royal Naval Squadron during WW1. The speaker was Colin Buxton who having done 30 years research gave an extremely talk with many facts and figures (too many to go into detail here). The Naval 8 squadron was formed in 1916 and subsequently early aircraft were replaced by Sopwith Pups and Camels. Each plane being given a name e.g. Hilda. He compared our planes to those of the Germans which were made of metal and their pilots who were given heroic status.

The operations were mainly reconnaissance and the air crew were supported by a very dedicated ground crew. The pilots flew in open cockpits in temperatures dipping to -35 degrees in Winter and whale oil was used to combat frostbite. There was no mandatory flying clothing and many pilots bought their own uniforms.

Sadly, at the end of his talk Colin gave a summary of the casualties. This was an excellent talk and Colin Buxton is a very good speaker.

After supper the raffle was drawn and the three prizes were won by David Alston, Carolyn Brewster and Catherine Lister.

Our next meeting, which is a members night, will be on Thursday 11th May.

## Middlemoor Community Benefit Fund Panel Members Wanted

We are currently looking for Community Panel Members for the Innogy Renewables UK Middlemoor Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund. As a local parish council in close proximity to the wind farm we would appreciate any help you may be able to offer in promoting this vacancy.

The panel member position will involve three meetings a year to make recommendations on grant applications to the Community Foundation. We are particularly interested in attracting applicants from North Charlton, which is currently unrepresented on the Panel. The deadline for applications to the position of community panel member is **1 June 2017**.

The £81,000 per year fund covers the Parish of Eglingham, Northumberland. Community groups, charities, parish councils and schools can apply for grants from £250 upwards for a range of projects. Individuals can apply for grants up to £2,000. Priority is given to applications that come from, or benefit residents within the Parish of Eglingham.

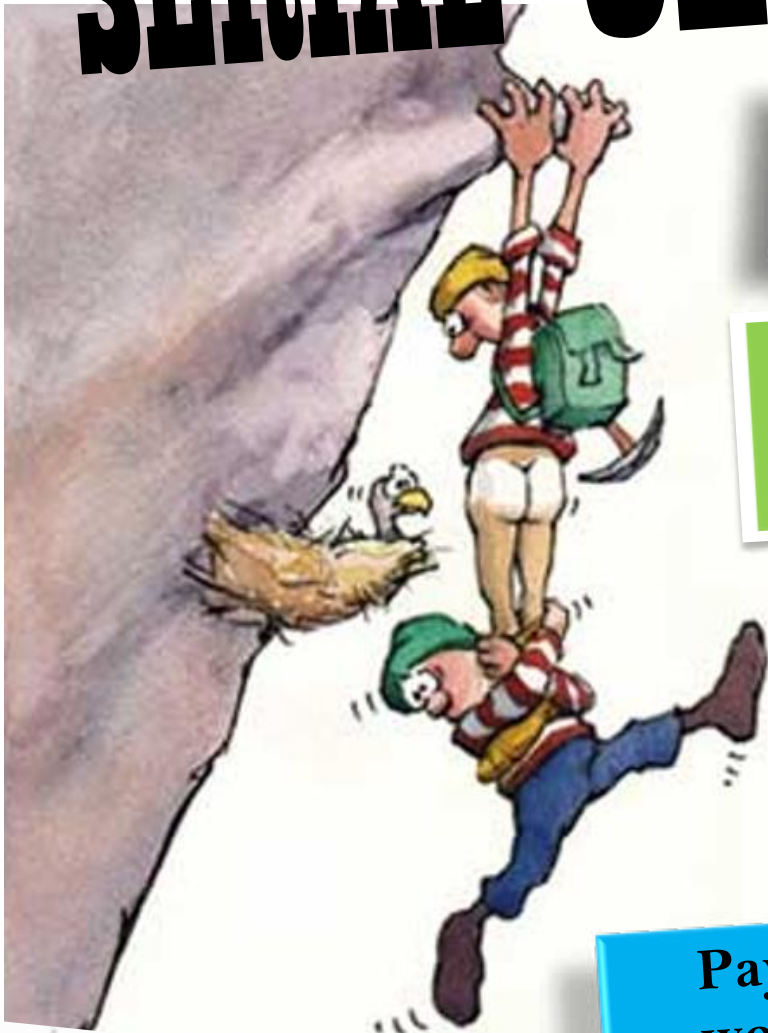

After a long wait for delivery the roller arrived towards the latter part of last season and is already making a huge difference to the playing surface of the ground.

Thomas Parkinson, Chairman and Club coach said:

*Our new roller has been a fabulous addition to Rock Cricket Club. It will be an essential*

*part of our grounds keeping equipment. The assistance of Councillor Cairns was really generous and made the difference between us getting the roller or not.*

Councillor Kate Cairns said:

*Sport and exercise is crucial to health and wellbeing. I have always encouraged those around me to be active, whether it be to take the stairs instead of the lift, or run a marathon. With 60% of children in the UK obese or overweight - and an even higher rate in the north-east - and with rising stress and mental health issues, outdoor exercise and team sport is absolutely crucial for all, especially our young people.*

I am delighted to have been able to contribute to the quality of the facilities. The club is clearly committed to serving the young people of the community and is well deserving of this funding. I wish them well for the season.

### **Warning signs South Charlton**

I have requested that warning signs are placed in South Charlton to slow traffic and protect children and elderly people. The children warning sign will be placed at the west end (both sides of the village hall) and elderly people warning signs at the east end (either side of the care home). As it is the start of the financial year, officers are just putting together new projects now and I hope that the new signs can be erected quickly.

### **Pothole repair**

Potholes down remote lanes are often low priority for the council. I have asked officers to inspect the road to The Whinney and Humbleheugh and they have ordered that 10 potholes and plaster patches be repaired.

### **County Council Election - 4th May**

I hope everyone has received my leaflet demonstrating the action I have taken over the last three years. I have worked hard to really listen to residents, respond to hundreds of your requests and represented you at County Hall. It has been fantastic and fascinating to get to know so many local people through the parish council, casework and local events. Thank you to those who have shown appreciation for my work.

Minutes of the meeting held on Friday April 7th 2017 at South Charlton Village Hall.

**Present** – Chair D Alston, Cllrs W. Purvis, J Lawson, P McIver, S Wright. Apologies for absence. Cllrs A Sutcliffe, Ian Grant, E Stafford and J Robson and County Councillor K Cairns.

**Eglingham Community Field:** The clerk had received an email from Drew-Carr-Ellison confirming that the metal handrail and concrete path leading from Eglingham Community field to the former gateway with Eglingham school would be removed and the area regrassed.

**North Charlton bus stop;** The clerk had checked with Northumberland County Council who confirmed that the bus stop is the responsibility of the Parish Council. Councillors agreed to support the parishioners request for lighting on the bus stop, discussed at the previous meeting, and the chair is to investigate solar powered lighting. BT phone box removal; The clerk had contacted BT who confirmed that the public telephone boxes at Eglingham and South Charlton will be removed as no objections were raised at consultation but that the date for their removal would be in the Autumn.

**Website training;** Cllr P McIver is liaising with Andy Gray to organise his training session for the Parish website.

**Speeding;** The clerk had contacted Northumbria Police regarding residents concerns of speeding through Eglingham Village and had received a return email from new Neighbourhood Sgt Sharon Wilmore-Greaves. Sgt Wilmore-Greaves is in the process of reviewing the Speedwatch Volunteers and their areas of concern and will contact the clerk following her meeting on April 7. The chair requested that the clerk ask the Sergeant if she would attend a parish council meeting later in the year when the new councillors are in place. Cllr McIver also raised residents concerns regarding receiving regular updates on rural crime in the area. The clerk will also raise this with the Neighbourhood Sgt.

## **Middlemoor Windfarm Community Funds Applications;**

The Community Foundation are looking for panel members for the Middlemoor Windfarm Community Fund. Applications should be submitted by June 17. For further information contact [pb@communityfoundation.org.uk](mailto:pb@communityfoundation.org.uk).

The clerk had received an update from David Marshall regarding the application for the North Charlton Broadband extension. The grant panel had suggested additional funding could be obtained through iNorthumberland. An application was made and iNorthumberland has awarded an initial £6094 with a further £3047 from the Community Foundation and followed by a further sum of £9140 from iNorthumberland on completion of the work.



**Election/nomination process;** Nominations had been submitted to the Elections Office of Northumberland County Council for the election of parish councillors for the Parish of Eglington. Following the close of nominations the clerk had received notification that the following persons will be elected as parish councillors without a contest- David Alston, David Biesterfield, Andy Gray, June Lawson, Paul McIver, Julia Robson, Holly Stafford. The Parish Council will then seek to co-opt the three remaining seats to make the numbers of parish councillors to 10.

Councillor Bill Purvis who has served the Parish Council for 30 years made a speech on his standing down. Cllr Grant had also forwarded a message of thanks to all serving councillors on his own standing down. The Chair again thanked Cllrs Purvis, Sutcliffe, Stafford and Grant and Cllr Wright, who has also announced she is to stand down, on their hard work over the years for the parish.

**Lime Trees, Church Lane, Eglington;** The chair David Alston declared an interest on this topic and this part of the meeting was chaired by Cllr Bill Purvis. Carolyn Brewster was in attendance to seek the parish council's support for a proposed application to Northumberland County Council to fell the five Lime Trees in the Church Lane and to replace with four smaller Ornamental trees. Carolyn explained that over the last 35 years the trees, which are the responsibility of Northumberland County Council had been damaged by intrusive management including pollarding. As the trees age they are more susceptible to disease and there is already a possibility that two of the trees are unsafe. There is widespread support in the village for the removal of the and the Parish Council was unanimously in favour of the proposal and the clerk will liase with Carolyn.

Cllr McIver raised residents concerns regarding the condition of the earth bank along the footpath between Eglington Village and Eglington Terrace. It was advised that the earth bank is the responsibility of the landowners rather than the parish council or local authority but that the residents affected could make a collective approach if they were minded to seek action from Northumberland County Council.

Cllr McIver also raised residents concerns that the dog fouling bin at the bottom of Eglington Terrace is not being emptied. The clerk will investigate the frequency of emptying with the County Council

**ANNUAL meeting** – Eglington Parish Council will hold its annual meeting followed by the annual Parish meeting on Wednesday May 10th at South Charlton Village Hall.

## History – The Charlton's in the late 13th Century

A bit of local history passed onto Hear Abouts via John Sawyer at North Charlton from the "*Northumberland Subsidy roll of 1296*" edited by Constance Fraser (1968)

### **North Charlton** (*Northcharleton*)

Member of the barony of Alnwick, held with Adderstone by the lords of Ditchburn for the service of a knight's fee and valued in 1289 at £40. In 1253 Ralph son of Roger possessed a forge in the wood at North Charlton. In 1266 an agreement was reached between him and the prior and convent of Durham touching rights of pasture on the moor between North Charlton and Ellingham. In 1295 he granted William de Vescy his mills at North Charlton. Between 12th and 14th centuries there was a chapel here dedicated to St. Giles with a graveyard.

Member of the barony of Alnwick, held with Hoppen and Fallodon by the Lucker family for the service of one knight's fee. A chapelry dependant on Ellingham.

# SPITTING IN THE BOWL

I am very much interested in family history and exploring the lives behind the names that appear in my family tree. I have a number of different family trees on a commercial website "Ancestry" but I keep them private to avoid those people who want to take the research of others without putting in any effort themselves. I do have an advantage with an unusual and very local surname but it can prove frustrating when parish registers do not go back far enough. I have a number of strands emanating from several "caves" with my surname that refuse to link together.

We were lucky enough to holiday in California last year with a distant cousin of mine who lives in San Francisco. Now there's another thing, how do you remember who is a first, second, third or indeed a once-removed cousin. Drifting off, a few years ago one of my (first) cousins was visiting my sister when she was accosted on the pavement by a man she had never seen before who said to her, "Hello, we're freends." Margaret looked him up and down and dashed into the safety of my sister's house. She soon discovered, however, that the man was her second cousin, a fact that he knew and she obviously did not. "Freend" means locally that you are related. It saves on working out the first, second, third and once-removed bit altogether.

Returning to San Francisco, if you've kept up, my "freend" had organized a dinner party for us. Sitting next to my husband was a lady interested in family history and they got into a discussion about their various antecedents. She then asked my husband whether he had "spat into the bowl". Now that's not the greatest one-liner in the world when you're tucking into your main course. There followed a prolonged silence while he tried to work out where this was going and then it all became clear. She was talking about DNA tests. DNA testing is the very latest tool in family history research.

I've never been particularly enthusiastic about this process as I think I can probably guess my genetic make-up. Americans are more likely to be keen on DNA testing as it helps in their search for their roots outside the United States. However, recently, I got into a debate with someone on the "Ancestry" website over whether her ancestor was the brother of my 3 times great grandfather. She declined to accept my view, although I KNEW I WAS RIGHT! And despite me demolishing all her alternative candidates, she threw in the DNA card. She and her father had had their DNA tested and "Ancestry" were able to make matches between people with family trees who had taken the test. If I did it a definite link could be established.

He is a bit more of a mongrel than me, being born in London with ancestors from East Anglia, Wiltshire, Gloucestershire and even Northumberland. His two times great grandfather was born in "Exham" as the London enumerator for a census return recorded. We're all familiar with UK police dramas on the TV so I was expecting an oversized cotton bud, a glass tube and a pair of gloves so that I could swab my mouth. But what did I find.....yes, a small glass phial with a wide funnel attached to it so that I could spit into its bowl. Who'd have thought it! "Me spit" has now winged its way to the States, via

Dublin of course, where they will be preparing to discover amazing things from it.

Another worrying issue is something my sister read. You will need to know that she has the attention span of a gnat and so I have the merest snippet of a story that she may have picked up from the Daily Mirror or one of those chat magazines or even the Facebook. Anyway, she read that "someone" has done research which proves that people with rare blood groups are really fallen angels. Both my sister and I have a rare blood group so we have fallen from grace at some point. I now fear that my DNA results will reveal either that the computer says "no" or that my genetic make-up is largely alien. I could become of serious interest to the security services.

Anyway, I'll let you know how I go on, if I am permitted to, of course.

Now should I warn my sister that she may get a knock on the door from people wearing white forensic suits and face masks, carrying oversized cotton buds, to be taken away in the interests of national security? Nah.
