# Alnmouth Community Rowing

What's an article about rowing doing in Hearabouts I hear you asking. Well, I'll start at the beginning. Last July, after a conversation with someone else in the village who is also a skiff rower, I decided to look into rowing as a possible new activity/sport. So what exactly is a skiff? It's a type of rowing boat based on the design of a traditional sea going Fair Isle skiff. The boats we row are called St Ayles skiffs and were designed by Ian Oughtred. The first one was built in 2009 and today there are over 250 that have been built in the UK and Worldwide, across nine other countries.

The skiff is supplied as a kit of marine ply parts and is designed to be built and rowed by the community. This is where Alnmouth Community Rowing comes in. They built and launched their first skiff 'Pride of Aln' in 2015, followed by a second skiff, Enfladea, built and launched in 2018/19.

When I first went along for a trial row I found an extremely welcoming group of people who were keen to pass on their skills and interest in skiff rowing. A skiff has four rowers and a cox and you row as a team, timing your strokes to match the rower in the stern who sets the pace. We row at sea whenever the conditions allow, but when the sea state is not conducive we row in the River Aln around high tides.



The club provides opportunities for both social and competitive rowing. Their main focus is on people enjoying the experience at whatever level they can participate. There are regular social rows during the week as conditions permit and these are supplemented with competitive training rows for members who want to take part in the inter club races that occur. My first taste of competitive rowing was at the 'World Championships' held in Holland this June. The Skiffie Worlds had 60 teams taking

part from 7 countries, including teams from America and Canada. As a sport it is in its early days but as more countries become involved the championships will grow.

It felt such a privilege being there representing the club in a genuinely international setting. It was a fantastic experience, and what other sport could you join at age 64 and compete in a World Championship?

I rowed in two categories, and with the 60 plus women's team, we won our heat and subsequently came fifth in the final. To get there however we had to undergo a training schedule that started in September and went all through the winter; that was tough at times!

The Skiffie Worlds are held every three years and in the previous competition Alnmouth came 24th. This year we improved to 16th overall and had around 40 club members supporting the team. But I hasten to add it's not all about racing, many rowers just take part in the regular social rows, which are very relaxed and enjoyable.

I have found the club members to be very welcoming and the friendliest group of people you could hope to meet. We are however always on the look out for new members from 18 years old upwards. If you are interested, you get to try both a river and a sea row to see what skiff rowing is like before you decide whether you want to join the club. Before moving in with Northumberland Dog Rescue I was living rough in Blyth cemetery - think of me as a ginger white Greyfriars Bobby – and I'm between 3 and 4 years old. walk nicely on the lead,

have an affectionate nature and am available for adoption via the website <u>www.northumberlandogrescue.co.uk</u>

Thanks to the National Highways Agency we've got a bit of a re-vamp at Patterson's Cottage; there's a nice new pull-in with tarmac to make it easier for customers and volunteers to park outside the kennels. This is just as well because we have a lot of boarding customers, a crop of new volunteers and ridiculous volumes of traffic on the A1. There has also been a big rise in the number of rescue requests – we are getting 3 or 4 calls every day from people unable to keep their dogs due to losing their homes or needing to work much longer hours just to pay their bills. We can't take on more of these desperate dogs until some of us move on, paws crossed the four out on trial are keepers. Foster homes are a help for some dogs so, if you have the capacity to care for a dog, even on a temporary basis, our humans would really like to hear from you. There is a Contact Us form on the website and we'd be very grateful for any help at all.

To tackle our own cost of living problems, there will be a pop-up café in operation at Bamburgh Cricket Pavilion on Sunday 4th September; tea, cake and homemade dog treats all on sale. We are collecting at Pets At Home, Morpeth on 10th and 11th and have a stall at the Dog Oscars at Northumberland Park, Tynemouth on the 10th. There's also a Fashion Show at Acklington Village Hall on the 23rd September featuring a selection of items from our shop in Amble. #### LOSS OF THE 470 BUS SERVICE

Transport Officers have advised that unfortunately, the 470 and 473 weren't operating efficiently (using far more resources than the low level of demand justified) and there wasn't scope in the budget to replace this on a like-for-like basis. The decisions made on all the service changes were based on ticket data supplied by Glen Valley and Travelsure covering periods earlier this year that were free from school holidays or other seasonal variations in demand. In the case of Eglingham, the data showed an average of 13 boardings per day, but ten of those were students travelling free to the Duchess High School in Alnwick. The remaining fare payers or pass holders were spread across all trips on the 470 (with no sign of regular usage) and didn't feel this justified the level of resources being deployed.

The 869 will run on schooldays between Wooler and the Duchess High School via Haugh Head, Lilburn, Eglingham and Alnwick Bus Station and will be available to students who are entitled to free travel and anyone else who would like to pay a fare (or use a concession pass). The morning bus will leave Wooler at 0750 and the afternoon one will return from Alnwick at 1555. Although the 869 will offer some service for Eglingham, It is realised that this is still very limited. We are working with community transport operator NEED on extending the coverage of resources it already has in the area and hope to finalise plans soon.

#### WHAT IS SILVER SUNDAY?

#### WHO IS TAKING PART IN 2022?

Anyone and everyone can take part. In 2021 there were more than 750 events for older people across the UK, organised by wonderful local groups, businesses and volunteers. At a time when the loneliness and isolation being felt by our older citizens has never been more acute, please help us by making this the biggest Silver Sunday yet by putting on a Silver Sunday event, helping others who are already involved or simply take part in a Silver Sunday event in your community.

Many organisations have already pledged their support and are starting to plan their Silver Sunday activities.

Silver Sunday started in Westminster in 2012 and since then has gained widespread support. The aim is to turn it into a national day matching Mothering Sunday and Fathers' Day, establishing it in the national consciousness as a day when we think about older people and help them. # Eglingham Community Field Tree Planting

South Charlton's tree planting scheme to mark the Queens Jubilee, as reported in May's Hear Abouts, is a great example of a small village with a big community spirit. In Eglingham, the community had similar plans for tree planting on the village's Community Field after a consultation with residents who were overwhelmingly in favour. Although there was a limited supply of trees, the Woodland Trust generously donated 60 whips to plant two copses of 30 trees, each giving lots of benefits for the environment, the climate, and diversifying the habitat for residents to enjoy, whilst maintaining adequate space for other community events.

The Woodland Trust, the country's foremost tree planting charity, gave detailed advice on the spacing and planting of the trees. However, the majority of the Parish Council disagreed with this and used anecdotal advice to change the originally agreed plan. This was done without any further consultation with the community. The few trees that were eventually planted were not even sited according to the revised plan approved by the Parish Council and are unlikely to survive. This is a tragic waste as the trees could have been enjoyed by another committed community.

Tree planting on the Community Field was a great idea to support biodiversity, and the Woodland Trusts Big Climate Fightback. It was a missed opportunity for community involvement and to get more residents invested in the management of the field.

The tree planting could have been the village's lasting memorial for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and it is such a shame that individuals without the necessary expertise and a differing agenda from the community have denied the opportunity for Eglingham's residents to Plant a Tree for the Jubilee as South Charlton's have done with their commendable positive community spirit.
